Who can have MAID?

- There are eligibility criteria that must be met for someone to have MAID.
 This criteria is set out in the Criminal Code of Canada.
- The patient must be capable of making their own health decisions.
 Others, including power of attorney and healthcare proxies, cannot request MAID for someone else.
- Qualified physicians or nurse practitioners complete assessments to determine if a patient is eligible for MAID. Eligibility is assessed on a case by case basis.
- The Provincial MAID Program and MAID assessors require access to the patient's medical information as part of determining their eligibility.
- Patient's considering MAID as an end -of-life option should contact the MAID program when they have been told they have a serious and incurable condition.

What is MAID?

Medical Assistance in Dying (MAID) is a legal end of life option.

MAID is a process where a person who meets a number of criteria is given medications at their request by a qualified healthcare provider to cause their death.

The patient must make an explicit request for MAID. Explicit request means a direct request that clearly states what is wanted. This request cannot come from another person.

MAID is not an advance healthcare directive.



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What is the timeline?

MAID is not a 'rushed' or 'urgent' procedure.

It can take days to weeks to months to determine a patient's eligibility, depending on circumstances (patient details, assessor availability, availability of medical information, etc.)

While patient eligibility is being determined, the local healthcare/ palliative care team will continue to provide care to the patient.

Where can I have MAID?

A medically assisted death can occur in a variety of settings: home, cabin, hospital, hospice, long term care home, etc.

MAID cannot occur in a public place (i.e. a park). There are a small number of care settings that do not allow MAID to occur.

The Provincial MAID Program works with the patient and others involved in their care to arrange for a move to another location, if needed.

Can I change my mind?

Yes, the patient can change their mind at any point in the process, right up until the first medication is given.
